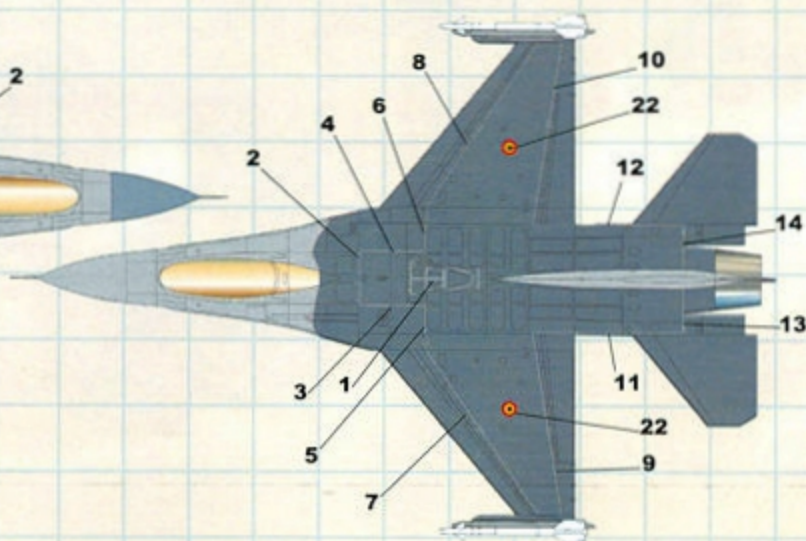

The F-16 Fighting Falcon, also known as “Viper,” evolved from a 1972 USAF lightweight fighter prototype program to create a small, low-cost, air superiority day fighter designed for high performance and ease of maintenance. It achieved combat-ready status in October 1980. Since then, 21 foreign nations, including Belgium, Denmark, Turkey, Egypt, and Israel, have purchased the F-16, making it the most popular fighter in the world. The varied national insignia, squadron markings, and camouflage markings of these international F-16s are depicted in this new, *all-color* work from noted artist and writer Lou Drendel. The book has more than 200 color photos on 64 pages and soft covers.
